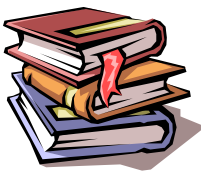
Shirley Kelley and her crew worked their usual magic in the kitchen, providing a delicious lunch served by hard-working male waiters.

Now the enchantment of the holidays meets with the pure storytelling genius of Luanne Rice, as she presents readers with a special gift for the season and a Christmas classic in the making.

Every year on the first day of December Christopher Byrne traveled from his farm in Nova Scotia to sell Christmas trees on the streets of Manhattan. It was said that the Cape Breton trees were special, that the Northern Lights charged the needles with magic. But this year there'd be no cheer for the widower and his 12 year old daughter, Bridget.

For New York City had taken Christy's only son, headstrong 16 year old Danny, who'd run off without a trace save a single postcard bearing a terse, unforgiving message: "I'm doing grand – don't worry about me." Christy wouldn't have come to the city at all if it weren't for the business – and to set up his trees on the corner where he last saw his son, in case Danny came back.

Librarian Catherine Tierney used to love the holidays: the lights, the carols, the nip in the air. She and her husband had always reveled in the spirit of the season, and in sharing their own joy and love with those less fortunate. But after Brian's death on Christmas Eve three years earlier, the festivities seemed to start too early and last too long.

On the quaint Chelsea street where she lives, Catherine will meet the tree seller from Nova Scotia. Both figured the world had forgotten the true meaning of Christmas. But they hadn't counted on finding each other, on fate, "on second chances" – and on a holiday gift of new love and new hope that would last a lifetime.

Recipe for Onion-Lovers

- 6 med. onions, sliced thin
- 1/2 c. butter
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3/4 lb. Swiss cheese, grated
- French bread, sliced
- 1/4 c. melted butter



Preheat oven to 350. Butter shallow 9x13 pan. Melt 1/2 c. butter over medium heat. Add onions and saute until tender and translucent. Combine soup, milk, salt and pepper. Pour onions into baking dish; add soup mix and stir. Sprinkle top with cheese. Dip one side of bread slices in melted butter; arrange on top of cheese with butter side up to cover most of baking pan. Bake about 30 min. until bread browns. Serve hot.
